Team work to help the animals of St. Charles Parish

- St. Charles Humane Society funds all medication for our shelter animals manages the adoption fee, rabies vaccine, microchip & low cost surgeries

Statistics

- Annual calls avg 2,700
- Animals taking shelter refuge ~1650 (1.1%)
- Number of spay/neuters low cost plus residents 1300/year
- Adoptions increased by 30%
- Feral surgeries increased by 392% in January
- Monthly intake averages 60 dogs (21% go back to owner), 77 cats (2.5% go back to owner) for 2016
- Euthanasia rate 3% if excluding those with aggression that cannot be safely integrated back into society or severe medical issues. When including all cases 25% K9, 35% feline.

Mission: to provide a service to the people by protecting the animals of St Charles Parish, secure a safe environment for all homeless creatures and improve the quality of life for all animals

What we are...

- Low cost spay/neuter for dog/cat families qualifying for poverty level, on government assistance
- LASPCA program (15-20 sxs jan/feb)
- Offer rabies vaccines \$10, microchips
 \$20 M-F to all resident animals
- If a stray is kept by an owner we offer \$80 adoption package-finder adopts and keeps animal out of shelter
- On call 24/7 utilizing 4 employees
- After 4 pm-pick up stray dogs/cats in custody of a police officer, injured wildlife
- Traps for nuisance animal relocation

What we are not...

- Not a low cost clinic
- Do not chase loose animals at night
- Do not pick up animals in traps at night /weekend









Goals

- Make the resident's customer service experience exceptional. Encourage volunteers, other adoption venues, decrease our intake via education and spay/neuter.
- Integrate medicine and management to maximize disease control & increase adoption rate of healthy/socialized animals
- Provide food, shelter and enrichment for the animals while here. ADOPT!



Reconnecting pet owners

- Lost dogs/cats posted on SCP animal control FB page within 24 hours of intake
- Resident: bring proof of ownership (i.e. vet records, microchip info, pictures

\$20 at shelter-reunites families with their furry friends



\$10 for this coming rabies drive April 2nd, 2017



Temperment

Dogs: socialization sensitive period 14 weeks

Cats: early socialization 2-7 weeks, 12 max typically













Community cats / feral/ wild

- Free sterilization program increased 392% since January
- Proof of St Charles Parish residency.
- Surgery, ear tip, rabies, resident releases him where found
- Averaged 5-15/month when free. Now 55/month with 2 staff members that are feral coordinators



After 4 and weekends 1-800-256-2749

- Resident will be given a CLAIM
- Resident calls Kenny Schmill 985-785-9007 or 985-233-9370 and provides the claim # (Kenny cannot go out without this)
- Our residents ARE NOT charged
- Alligators less than 4 feet not considered a nuisance. DO NOT feed them.



Coyotes

Bring your animals in at night and watch them during the day, the small ones, and take precautions Other common sense tips are don't leave food or trash in the open and control weeds and brush. Coyotes look for an easy meal, but they're not usually a threat to humans.
