
# APPENDIX STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT DOCUMENTS



Appendix C includes descriptions of the community workshops and a copy of the survey that the project team made available for community feedback. The survey includes 23 questions in addition to demographic information. Some of the questions ask about the respondents' primary transportation method, perceptions of sidewalks and bicycle infrastructure, perceptions of safety, reasons for using non-motorized transportation, and factors that would make them more likely to walk and bike.

## Workshop: Visioning

West Bank at Hahnville High School on June 6, 2017

East Bank at Destrehan High School on June 14, 2017

The first of two sets of public workshops encouraged residents to become engaged in discussions about the parish's assets, challenges, and potential for improved pedestrian and bicycling networks. This workshop was held on both the East Bank and West Bank. At the beginning of each workshop, the project team and the elected officials in attendance were introduced, followed by a presentation introducing the goals of the project and emphasizing that the community's involvement is essential to its success.

# Workshop Activity

Workshop attendees were divided into small groups and asked to identify areas of concern for walking and bicycling safety by marking them on maps. Attendees also pinpointed areas where they desired new or improved pedestrian or bicycle routes. Afterwards, project team members guided attendees through discussions about the assets and challenges of areas throughout the parish. Attendees were asked to record their comments and opinions directly on maps or notecards.

The following information was gathered directly from the public at the workshops and aggregated by geographic area.

## Results

Below are the results received from the community members who attended Workshop 1: Visioning.

# Luling

### Public Indicated As Unsafe Routes

- Paul Maillard Road is not safe to ride or walk
- · Difficult to cross Highway 90 at Paul Maillard
- Unsafe to cross from Paul Maillard to Magnolia Ridge at Highway 90
- · Old Spanish Trail is not safe to ride or walk
- · Difficult to cross Highway 90 at Barton Avenue
- There are no sidewalks along Barton Avenue. The street is lined with open ditches, and a lot of people walk in this area
- Difficult to cross River Road at the West Bank Bridge Park
- Difficult to cross River Road at Lawrence Drive to access the levee trail (near Monsanto)
- It is unsafe to access the Levee from Davis Drive across River Road
- The intersection of Davis Road at the Rail Road is dangerous
- Primrose Street from Highway 90 to Texaco Road is unsafe for bicycling or walking
- Sugarhouse Road from Maryland to Texaco Road
- West Heather Drive from Maryland to Texaco Road
- The Lakewood and Heather Drive intersection is an unsafe intersection and very busy
- · Willowdale is very unsafe

- · Davis from River Road to Barton
- · Lakewood from Highway 90 to West Heather Drive
- Beaupre Drive from Heather Drive to Willowdale

- Need a sidewalk crossing over the railroad at Ellington Avenue in Luling
- Improve the levee access at Sugarhouse Road
- Sugarhouse Road from River Road to Luling Elementary and Angus Drive surrounding Luling Elementary
- Riverfront linear parks along the Bridge Parks on the Levee side. Access across River Road to the Levee is difficult and unsafe
- Need public rest areas near the Levee
- · Maintenance program for the Levee path
- Ashton Plantation Boulevard from Ashton Plantation a Master Planned community to River Road
- Safe crossing from Boutte to the commercial area across Highway 90 and Old Spanish Trail at the end of Paul Maillard Road
- Paul Maillard Road needs improvements for bicycle and pedestrian safety
- · Angus Drive from Paul Maillard to Sugarhouse Road
- · Sugarhouse Road from Angus to River Road
- Improve the Parish Water Intake ramp to the Levee trail at the end of Sugarhouse Road for the surrounding neighborhood to use
- Improve Primrose Drive from Highway 90 to Texaco Road
- Improve Maryland Drive from Primrose to Highway
   90
- Texaco Road from Blouin Canal / Levee Road to the Holy Family Church
- Improve Heather Drive from Texaco Road to Highway
   90
- Improve the intersection at Lakewood Drive and Highway 90
- Improve St. Anthony Street from Highway 90 to Birch Street and Birch Street from St. Anthony Street to Lakewood Drive to create an alternate route parallel to Highway 90

- Improve the commercial corridor along Highway 90 from St. Anthony to the St. Charles Library. Create a walkable corridor for Lakewood Elementary School, the Library, churches, and commercial businesses.
- Improve Davis Road from Highway 90 to River Road
- Improve the Levee to add a path along the existing levee parallel to Barton Avenue
- Widen the crossing or put in a separate path on Davis
   Drive at the Rail Road Crossing

### Destrehan

### Public Indicated As Unsafe Routes

- Bicycling along Ormond Boulevard is difficult and unsafe because there are often vehicles parked in the bike lane, speeding traffic, and standing water in the bike lane. The buffer zone needs to be a better barrier between vehicles and people bicycling.
- At Destrehan High School, students park
   across Schexnaydre Lane in the surrounding
   neighborhood and cross through a private field at
   the end of Cedar Lane to get to the school. No safe
   crossing or sidewalks are provided.
- It is unsafe to travel down River Road to Schexnaydre Lane
- The pathway behind Ormond Park and Covenant Church
- Villere Drive from Ormond Boulevard to Ormond Tree

### Public Suggested New Routes & Facilities

- Bicycle access over the Hale Boggs Memorial Bridge or a protected crossing under the bridge.
- Nottaway Drive from Ormond Boulevard to Longview Drive
- Plantation Road from Ormond Boulevard to Acadia Lane
- · Need continuous sidewalks along River Road

## Bayou Gauche, Des Allemands, Paradis

# Public Indicated As Unsafe Routes

- · Old Spanish Trail
- · Highway 90
- Highway 306 is unsafe from Paradis to Bayou Gauche
- · There is gravel in the road and on the shoulder

- of Highway 90 at the truck staging area near Hahnville. It is dangerous to ride a bicycle here.
- The intersection of Audubon and Highway 90 in Paradis is unsafe for people walking across Highway 90.
- · Barber Road is not safe.

# Public Suggested New Routes & Facilities

- Highway 632 from Highway 90 to Bayou Gauche Road. Highway 632 from Bayou Gauche Road to the Canal levee.
- Highway 306 Bayou Gauche Road from Highway 90 to the boat launches. This is a good bicycle route with little traffic, although it is narrow and could use improvements to make it safe.
- Bicycle boulevard in Paradis parallel to Highway 90.
   Barber Road and Kirk Drive.
- Levee to Trails Program Using the existing levee along Bayou Gauche, Bayou Des Allemands, and Grand Bayou Canal, creates a route from Des Allemands through Bayou Gauche all the way to Paradis. A bridge at Canal Number 6 connects the Levee Trail to Highway 633. The route creates an off-road connection for walkers and bicyclists similar to the Mississippi River Levee Trail. Avoiding high traffic highways and vehicular traffic.
- · Walking path along Bayou Gauche Road.
- · New park at the library in Paradis.
- Need a safer intersection crossing at the Dollar Store and Texaco in Paradis. A lot of people from the surrounding area walk to the stores.

The second round of public workshops focused on participants reviewing and discussing the proposed networks, which were developed by the project team based on numerous factors, including feedback from the previous workshop.

# Workshop Activity

At the beginning of each workshop, the project team and the elected officials in attendance were introduced, followed by a presentation stating the purpose of the project, reviewing the information gathered during the visioning workshops and survey, and discussing the overall goals of the Pedestrian & Bicycle Master Plan. Residents provided feedback directly on network maps by locating alternate routes where they would receive increased usage, identifying intersections in need of safety improvements, and proposing additional bicycle and pedestrian facilities, such as trailheads. Ideas generated in the workshops were evaluated for feasibility, efficacy, connectivity, and safety. The results influenced planning of the final

networks. See Appendix B for Proposed Networks. Workshop: Industry Mapping

St. Charles Parish Courthouse on July 13, 2017

This was a mapping workshop for industry stakeholders, held at the St. Charles Parish Courthouse. Industry representatives were asked to review the proposed pedestrian and bicycle network suggestions and list of improvements. Feedback included concern for the security of plants. The industry participant's comments were documented on the maps by the project team and some changes were integrated into the proposed networks. Moreover, to respond to the public's desire for better access, Waterford is willing to help facilitate connections between neighborhoods and the Mississippi River Trail. - » Conduct the next round of public workshops at which attendees will be asked to review a draft pedestrian and bicycle network and design recommendations and provide feedback on priorities.
